
Background

The debate on global health financing is closely linked to the issue of localization, particularly concerning how financial resources are allocated and managed locally. Some models of global health financing encourage the decentralization of resources, allowing local authorities to have greater control over fund management. Localization in the context of global health financing therefore involves recognizing the importance of local actors and creating flexible financing mechanisms that consider the specificities of each country. As a result, donors are moving towards these new financing models, which involve directly allocating funds to governments and local organizations, hence putting them in the driver seat.

To support this effort and better position governments to access these funds, a fiduciary agency was established within the country program of Pathfinder Burkina in 2018 to serve as an intermediary between donors, governments, and local organizations.

What is the Pathfinder Burkina Fiduciary Agency?

The FA is a structural entity of Pathfinder designed to act in the interest of governments, local organizations, and donors through programmatic and financial technical assistance tailored to the needs of each stakeholder.
